Water to Heal the Aquifer

Scott Campbell, Campbell Law Terry Scanlan, Vice President, SPF Water Engineering

Major portions of Elmore County have experienced large ground water deficits since the late 1970's. In 1981 the Idaho Department of Water Resources imposed significant water development restrictions on major areas of the County. Despite continual aquifer declines over many decades, no-one had pursued a long term solution. However, in 2015 Elmore County took on this challenging situation. Since then the County has invested over \$250,000.00 in a concerted effort to import water to the Mountain Home Plateau to help solve this long term problem. Since that start, Elmore County has obtained approval of three new water permits which allow development of approximately 20,000 acre feet of water for aquifer recharge and supplemental irrigation. This exciting effort breaks new ground in water resource development and gives Elmore County hope for a brighter future.

Josh Tyree, Partner, Harris CPAs

Cities, counties, and other local government agencies are increasingly adopting long-term financial forecasting as a critical component of their financial management practices. Forecasts can be used to create a strategic context for evaluating the annual budget, to establish a baseline for measuring the long-term effects of decisions, to test the economic effects of best-case and worst-case funding scenarios, and to establish a baseline projection of revenues, expenditures, and future cash flows and fund balances. In this session, we will identify the key steps in creating a sound forecasting process and best practices for ensuring that your forecast is compelling and informative.
